Why do the econometric-based studies on the effect of warming on agriculture disagree?: a meta analysis

OXFORD ECONOMIC PAPERS, 70(2), 2018(April): 392-416

This article conducts a meta-analysis based on 130 primary econometric base studies to better understand the conflict among the existing estimates on the effect of warming on agriculture. However, we also find that primary studies that accounted for adaptation by using the yearly temperature measure and adopting the hedonic modelling approach would disagree less, and would also produce estimates that are consistent with the simulation based literature in that warming could be beneficial for agriculture in the high latitudes but damaging in the low latitudes.
