





State - wise Total Transfers % change in 2015-16 over 2014-15








Social Sector Expenditure —Trend (1990-2016) IN LAKH CRORE (CURRENT PRICES)




Social Sector Expenditure —Trend (1990-2016) IN LAKH CRORE (2011-12 PRICES)



Social Sector Expenditure Trend (% GDP)




Social Sector Expenditure across States (Rs. Crore)




In FY 2015-16, SSE has increased in absolute terms across all States over FY 2014-15.
